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NOT GREATNESS BUT GOD:

Revivals and Higher Education

Revivals in America's past lit fires of spiritual renewal. These often swept higher education campuses. Sometimes these spiritual fires were ignited by students and employees.

Those who have studied American revivals know well the revival-campus connection. Keith Hardman in his book, Seasons of Refreshing (Grand Rapids, 1994) traces a good bit of this relationship. He points out that revival swept Yale in 1802 and several times again during the next fifteen years (p. 114). Certain colleges (Oberlin an example) were founded for the purpose of training young converts (pp. 160-61) and others (Harvard, Princeton, Yale) were touched by revival meetings (p. 210). Still other institutions (Dartmouth, University of Pennsylvania, Rutgers, Brown) were started due to the deepening educational interests that grew out of the revivals (p. 98).

Prayer of an Alumnus

A recent letter from a Grace alumnus caused me to think again about the history of this revival-campus relationship. The alumnus wrote that he wanted Grace to succeed but even more to "be successful in the plans of God." The letter continued:

"I've always enjoyed history and especially the great movements of God in our nation. It seems that the Lord has always begun great revivals through Christian schools. My prayer isn't so much for 'greatness' or 'good ink' in the history books about Grace, but that God would again pour His Spirit out on our nation. If it is His will, I pray that Grace would be a significant part of His work.

Without doubt other alumni agree with the prayer that Grace College and Seminary would be an instrument of use in God's work. All of us want the Grace ministry to be fueled by passion for Christ, driven to do His work in our world.

This desire, though, has led me to ask questions. What would this kind of reviving work of God look like on a campus? What were the characteristics of campus revivals in the past? What did those campus revivals have in common?

Characteristics of Campus Revivals

God's reviving work on campuses had several features in common. In each revival, it seems, certain characteristics were present, wherever the campus and whatever the period of history.

A POINT OF DECISION

Someone or a handful of people on a campus made a resolute determination to pursue God, not fully knowing all that doing so might mean. There is little doubt that the revival on Yale's campus in 1802 grew out of the resolute commitment of the president, Timothy Dwight. He came to Yale at a time when spiritual leadership was desperately needed. Under his leadership, the college was transformed. One tutor wrote to his mother that "Yale College is a little temple, prayer and praise seem to be the delight of the greater part of the students, while those who are still unfeeling are awed into respectful silence" (Hardman, p. 114 quoting Charles Keller, The Second Great Awakening in

Connecticut, New Haven, p. 42). Timothy Dwight reached a point of decision regarding God: God would be followed at all costs.

PASSION FOR GOD

During campus revivals passion for God grew. Awareness of personal sin deepened. Sin was confessed. Students and employees thirsted for the things of God. Patterns of life were interrupted and changed. The revivals at Yale turned a campus spiraling downward into a place of fervor and hope(Harding, pp. 111-12). Old habits of ignoring God's claims gave way to deep yearnings for Him.

CHANGED LIFESTYLES

When a revival came, pursuing God resulted in lifestyle changes among students and employees. These changes lasted over time. The focus of life fell more on the practice of the spiritual disciplines and less on other activities. In the 1850s numerous conversions occurred at both Yale and Amherst. "The president of Amherst College stated that nearly every student there claimed to have received God's grace and regeneration" (Harding, p. 179).

THIRST FOR LEARNING

A revival's impact typically resulted in a deeper thirst for learning and study. the College of New Jersey (later Princeton University) grew out of the famous "Log College" that trained men for ministry. A need developed for training Native Americans who came to know Christ as a result of the Connecticut revivals. Dartmouth developed out of efforts of Eleazar Wheelock to train these Native American converts (Hardman, pp. 96-97). At Yale revival caused students to be more serious about studying and prayers (Harding, p. 112).

CLEARER VISION

A revival prompted a clearer vision of what God wanted. Students caught sight of the global nature of God's work. The story of Samuel Mills at Williams College

is but one example. He and several other students were praying in a field next to the campus. Due to stormy weather they sought shelter under a haystack. Their meeting became known as the famous "Haystack Prayer Meeting" of 1806. Many consider this the birth of foreign missions in America. Harding concludes that this type of spiritual fervor on college campuses "inspired the sending of missionaries to every part of the globe" (Harding, p. 166). And later in the 1880's the thrust of students toward world evangelization went beyond all expectations, as hundreds volunteered for foreign service (Harding, pp. 210-11).

What About Grace?

As one studies past revivals, the above characteristics are encountered over and over again. If I were seeking to know whether genuine revival was happening on a campus, I would pay attention to these traits. Real revival prompts believers to pursue aggressively the pathway of godliness marked out in the Bible.

Pursuing God with passion is biblical (cp. Psa 42:1-2; 63.1; 119:131; 143:6; Phil 3:7-10; etc.). The true work of God in a person's life results in change, transformation (cp. Rom 12:1-2; Eph 4:17-5:10; etc.). God's work in His people prompts interest in learning and study (Ezra 7:8-10; 2 Tim 2:15; etc.). God's true work within a person leads to an increasingly clear vision of what He wants (2 Cor 5:17-21; Eph 1:18-21; Phil 4-6; etc.).

God's reviving work is present on the Grace College and Seminary campus when there is a decision to follow God whatever the cost, a passion for God, changed lifestyles, a thirst for learning, and a clearer vision of and commitment to what God wants. We see this happening but we pray for more.

Please join us in prayer. Pray we will desire God's deep work in us. May history record our love for God. May the Grace College and Seminary "ink" in the history books describe our thirst for God and our pursuit of His will. ▼

ENROLLMENT OUTLOOK

Another semester at Grace College and Seminary has begun. After all the



students have been recruited, dorms renovated, and curriculum planned, our students are finally back on campus for another exciting and promising year. Our enrollment figures for the 1996 school year were recently released and look very positive.

Total enrollment in all programs is up 4.9% from last year's 817 to this year's 857 students. College enrollment is up 7.8% from last year's 693 to this year's 747. The Undergraduate programs saw a 2.2% increase, while the Graduate program saw a dramatic 81% increase. Grace's Prison program through the Indiana State Prison, out of Michigan City, Indiana, holds an outstanding 74.2% increase. The Seminary as a whole was down 11% from 124 to 110 students. However, the Doctorate programs are up 11.1% from 45 to 50 students.

Please continue to pray for the College and the Seminary admissions counselors



as they call prospective students and travel to churches and schools.



THE LAW OF HAPPINESS

Happiness is not found by pursuing happiness; it is a by-product of pursuing God.

once heard of a man who was very unhappy in his work, unhappy with his family, and unhappy with life in general, so he decided to escape... to get away from it all. He joined a mute monastery, where he took a vow of silence. He could only say two words every five years.

This is perfect, he thought. No stress, no one to bug me, nothing but silence.

So he stayed there five years without uttering a syllable. At the end of the time, his superior called the man into his office and said, "You have two words which you can speak. Would you like to say anything?"

The guy nodded his head and said, "Bad food!"

So he went for another five years without uttering a syllable, and again, his superior called him in to his office and asked if he would like to say anything.

He nodded his head and he said, "Hard bed!"

And he went for another five years, and his superior called him in and asked him if he would like to say anything, and the guy said, "I quit!"

His superior responded, "Well, I'm not surprised. You've done nothing but complain since you got here!"

WHAT DO MOST PEOPLE WANT OUT OF LIFE?

Most people say they want to be happy.

When you ask most people what they want out of life they will say that they want to be happy. There are different ideas as to what it will take to be happy, but everyone pursues happiness the way he thinks it can be found for him. Some pursue happiness in wealth, others pursue it in poverty, but all pursue happiness.

As Christians, we may be vaguely uncomfortable admitting that a priority in life for us is happiness. It doesn't sound spiritual. Yet the Bible does not seem to shy away from presenting happiness as a valid longing:

Thou wilt make known to me the path of life; In Thy presence is fullness of joy; In Thy right hand there are pleasures forever. Psalm 16:11

It seems that God does not find our longings for happiness objectionable as long as the pursuit of happiness is centered in Him.

HOW CAN WE BE HAPPY?

By pursuing God, and trusting Him for happiness.

If we think that happiness comes only through maintaining favorable circumstances, life will give us a rude awakening. We cannot gain happiness by controlling people, possessions and circumstances. First, we cannot be happy merely with pleasurable circumstances at the core of our lives. Pleasurable circumstances make good frosting but not a good cake. Rich people are often bored and unfulfilled. Second, even if circumstances could make us happy, we cannot control them adequately enough to bring us consistent happiness.

A prime example of this is found in Charles Kuralt's book, A Life on the Road. Kuralt for many years was host of Sunday Morning, a weekly television program.,, and host of On the Road specials on CBS, in which he traveled around the United States in a motor home and filmed interesting stories about unusual people or happenings. Portions of his work often aired on The CBS Evening News with Walter Cronkite, who was one of the most respected men in America. Every evening when Cronkite completed his news cast he signed off in his distinctive voice and style, "And that's the way it is." It was one of the most famous sayings in America for decades.

Kuralt writes:

A woman wrote me a letter from Ohio. She said her parakeet could say, "And that's the way it is," like Walter Cronkite. We went there right away, of course. As soon as she opened the door, the parakeet said, "And that's the way it is." While we set up the lights and camera there in the living room, the parakeet watched us from the inside of his cage and said, "And that's the way it is!" We pointed the lens at the cage and started rolling. The parakeet looked at the camera and said:

"Aaaawk!"

The parakeet's owner said, "And that's the way it is!" to give him a cue.

The parakeet said, "Aaaaawk!"

"And that's the way it is!" she said patiently.

He said, "Aaaaaaawk!"

We turned off the lights to let the parakeet calm down. We went into the kitchen and had a cup of coffee and talked about the weather and other things. Then we sauntered back into the

living room, and pretended to pay no attention to the parakeet in his cage. The bird's owner thought this might work. We said nothing. The parakeet said nothing. We turned on the camera again.

The parakeet said, "Aaaaawk!"

After an hour or two of this, we packed up, promising to return some other time. We said goodbye to the disappointed woman

who wanted to see her parakeet on Walter Cronkite's news program. We closed the front door and started down the walk to the driveway, carrying our camera and lights. Behind us in the living room, we heard the parakeet say: "And that's the way it is!" (p. 197)

And that IS the way it is. You try to control circumstances, and you can't.

Peggy Noonan, former speech writer for Presidents Reagan and Bush wrote:

I think we have lost the old knowledge that happiness is overrated - that, in a way, life is overrated. We have lost somehow a sense of mystery - about us, our purpose, our meaning, our role. Our ancestors believed in two worlds, and understood this to be the solitary, poor, nasty, brutish and short one. We are the first generations of man that actually expected to find happiness here on earth, and our search for it has caused such unhappiness. The reason: if you do not believe in another, higher world, if you believe only in the flat material world around you, if you believe that this is your only chance at happiness - if that is what you

believe, then you are more than disappointed when the world does not give you a good measure of its riches, you are in despair (Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness, p. 214-215).

So true! If we pursue happiness in what this temporal life alone has to offer us, then life can be a profound disappointment. Pursue God and the fullness of the life He offers to those who serve Him, and happiness flows. Our ability to be happy in this life is greatly increased by the knowledge that complete happiness can be found only in the next life.

HOW CAN I CULTIVATE A GREATER CAPACITY FOR HAPPINESS?

things God has given me, rather than ungrateful for what He has not given me.

nce we have laid down a foundation for happiness by putting God at the center of our lives, we gain happiness largely by taking pleasure out of the constant stream of little things in life, rather than demanding a sufficient succession of big things. If only big things make us happy, we will not have a very happy life.

If you added up all the time you were happy from the big things, a person would be lucky to be happy for a year out of his whole life. However, if a person allows himself to be happy over little things, happiness becomes a much more frequent visitor. Let me mention a few of the things that can make me happy:

- · My wife's smile
- · The cardinal at my bird feeder.
- · The delicate lemon-yellow daylilies that bloom in July.
- · Two babies looking at each other in amazement in the grocery store check-out line.
- . The taste of fresh fruit in season.
- · Watching friends and family meeting at the airport.
- . The stained glass windows in the fancy church on Main Street.
- · A golden retriever puppy.

- · A post-card from a friend on vacation.
- My wife and I getting our baked potato soup recipe just right.
- The architecture of the courthouse in my hometown.
- Grilling hamburgers with friends and helping their boys fish off the end of the pier.

Sometime back, I began to develop the habit of imagining what life could be like without the various things I enjoy. Imagine what life would be like without food, clothing and shelter. Imagine if you had to fear someone kicking the door in and finding you worshiping. Imagine if you did not have anyone to love you, or anyone to love. Imagine if you lost the freedoms guaranteed in the Constitution. Imagine what life would be like if you didn't have a constant stream of little things to brighten your life.

This practice helped me in three ways:

- 1. It made me more aware of the things that I liked.
- 2. It made me more appreciative of them
- 3. This increased my capacity for happiness.

If they understood the difference, most people would put joy before happiness. Joy in life depends on accepting the will of God in our lives, and focusing on God's love, what He has done for us, is doing for us, and will do for us. Joy depends on enjoying the salvation brought to us in Jesus, and knowing that all our ultimate needs in life have already been met, and that God will see us through the hard times. Joy depends on knowing what we are deeply loved by God. Joy depends on serving Jesus, telling others about Him, knowing that God has chosen to use our feeble efforts to advance His kingdom. Joy can be sustained through pain and trials.

But happiness in life, I believe, depends on cultivation the ability to sift happiness out of the endless stream of ordinary things in life that come our way, realizing that if we didn't have them, the wouldn't seem so ordinary.

How can we be happier? Live for Jesus, place our ultimate hope in the next world and earn to be grateful for the endless stream of small things that, in His grace, come our way in this world. ▼



AROUND THE WORLD IN SEVEN DAYS

t isn't often that one gets to travel to other worlds without leaving his or her own country. But that's exactly what twelve Grace College and Seminary employees were privileged to do this summer as we embarked on a life-changing voyage into the heart of New York City. And "heart" is exactly what we discovered there. We found New Yorkers to be surprisingly

friendly and accommodating, and we saw first

hand that God is very alive and at work in the inner city. We met men and women who are individually brightening dark corners of the city when they remain faithful to their call and remember that love casts out all fear. What started out as a peek into ethnic and cultural diversity, eventually became an immersion into many of the worlds represented in this huge city, and the catalyst for real change in our personal and professional lives.

Under the guidance of Mr. Ron Matlack, Executive

Director of R.U.N. Ministries (Reaching Urban Neighborhoods), we were oriented to some of the work that's being done, and our hearts were opened to the possibility that some of us may be able to come back and serve New Yorkers in some capacity. Surprisingly, we found that we had far more in common with our urban counterparts in Christ than we thought before.

Who did we meet and what did we see? We met Pastor Ezra Nehemiah Williams of the Bethel Gospel Assembly in Harlem. Pastor Williams impressed all of us with his tireless zeal to meet the physical and spiritual needs of his neighborhood. We saw what God could do with a faithful flock who believes that Jesus is the only hope for addictions, violence, and despair. This thriving

church of over 2,000 members filled our souls with joy during their exuberant praise and communion service. As we sang, laughed, prayed, and fellowshipped together we all became more aware of the beauty of God's family in all its rich colors, styles, and cultures.

We also met Pastor Beatrice Almirez of the Victory Temple in the Bronx. Pastor Almirez, her family, and a faithful band of


new believers are carving out a sanctuary in the middle of an urban war zone. Mobile police units are stationed around the neighborhood, and the church itself was the scene of a brutal murder just months before when it was a billiards hall. Now, the tiny storefront building is open all day for people to seek refuge and hope. While visiting with this racially mixed congregation, we heard their story and learned that Pastor Almirez chose to stay in this violent neighborhood after her husband passed away. In her words, she did not feel "released of God's call," even though family members urged her to move back to California. But God has blessed her commitment to Him and to the neighborhood by allowing them to add vital ministries such as a residential recovery program for those seeking release from drugs and alcohol.

Ironically, because the shootings have stopped ever since the church opened its doors, the drug dealers on their street are the ones who protect the church from would-be vandals. As Ron Matlack kept telling us, those "tribal leaders" are the ones who can be reached when churches make a commitment to loving their people. We will never forget the image of Dr. Manahan walking under an umbrella with Manuel, a young man we met at the church. He had just stopped by that day, looking for a way to start over. A self-reported drug dealer, he was tired of the trap of

using and dealing drugs, had tried every government program, and was finally coming to see if this church could help him change. Our words and the love he sensed there wouldn't let him go. He accompanied us as we passed out tracts and participated in a street corner "blast" - 15 minutes of



> pioneer in interdenominational urban renewal, and a visit with Jose Ruiz at the American Bible Society. Here we got to tour their



VOLLEYBALL - FILIPINO STYLE

or the second consecutive summer, Grace basketball coach Jim Kessler took a group of athletes to the Philippine Islands for a missions trip. However, this summer, the group added a different twist. They also played volleyball. Joining Coach Kessler was Lady Lancer volleyball coach, Candace Moats and several volleyball players.

"Volleyball is an accepted sport for women in the Philippines," said Coach Moats. "Their culture does not allow much for women athletes, but volleyball is their sport."

The group of 12 men and women spent almost four weeks traveling and conducting clinics and camps in the Philippines and Hawaii. Their central point was Faith Academy, a missionary school in Manila. Coach Moats was able to share up-to-date information with the coaches at Faith Academy as well as several other schools in the area. She says, "It was a real highlight to get to know the coaches at Faith Academy and give them ideas for drills and strategies. We talked a lot, just trying to be a resource and encouragement for them."

In Manila, the team, along with Grace Brethren missionaries, Dan Beaver and Nathan Leigh, kept busy. The first week, they ran several clinics of volleyball and basketball in the surrounding neighborhoods or barangays. To attract people, they would have exhibition games of volleyball and basketball. They even brought candy and balloons. Following the clinics, they would share the Lord with those who came.

The second week at Manila, the group did a week-long Volleyball camp at Faith Academy. Over seventy boys and girls between 7-12th grades participated. "The level of high school volleyball in the Philippines is behind," says Coach Moats. "But at the collegiate level, it is intense. I would say we contributed by bringing more enthusiasm into the program at Faith by showing them up-to-date techniques and fundamentals. We gave them a little more motivation to keep going."

"We also concentrated on reinforcing the significance of athletics and showing the value of being a Christian in sports as you focus on discipleship and building character, not just results. We were able to spend a lot of time with the kids there. They are looking for love and acceptance through something which is very important to them," said Moats.

The next stop for the team was San Antonio Island and Hawaii. While in Hawaii, the team helped with the worship services in the three Grace Brethren Churches and conducted a basketball clinic.

Coach Moats plans to take a volleyball missions trip again next summer. Reflecting on the trip, she comments, "The greatest benefit for me was experiencing first hand the idea that it is God's power through me and not my own hard work and initiative that changes things and makes a difference in people's lives. That became very obvious to me during this trip. When we trust Him and let go of the results, that is when He truly works both in our lives and in the lives of those we try to serve."



BEYOND THE PLAYING FIELD

The Lancer Soccer team participated in a tournament in Mount Vernon, Ohio, in September. However, playing in the games was just a small part of the weekend's happenings. The Lancers invaded the Delaware Grace

Brethren Church with plenty of excitement that included a soccer clinic, a church service, and even a pie-throwing contest.

Pastor Jeff Gill and the Delaware church sponsored the soccer clinic where Lancer head coach Steve Miller and his crew taught soccer skills to 66 children grades 1-6. Forty-five of the children did not attend Delaware GBC. "We had ten stations where we would do different soccer drills, then we presented the Gospel," said Miller about the clinic. "The church plans to follow up with each of the children, so hopefully we were able to plant some seeds. We had a great time!"

Sunday morning, several of the soccer players shared their testimonies and some shared special music during the morning service. Since that weekend, the Lancers have received several letters of appreciation and thanks for their effort and positive testimonies. This is another illustration of how athletics at Grace College reaches beyond the playing field and into the lives of others. ▼


