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Dr. Ronald E. Manahan named President

Dr. Ronald E. Manahan was named the 5th President of Grace College and Seminary in an announcement made by Rev. Charles Thornton, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, to the administration, faculty, staff, and students on January 25.

Dr. Manahan has served Grace for the past 17 years. From 1977 to 1986 he held the position of Professor of Biblical Studies. From 1987 to 1990 he served as Vice President of College Academic Affairs, from 1990 to 1993 as Provost, and from 1993 to January, 1994 as Acting President.

He holds a Diploma from Grand Rapids School of the Bible and Music, a B.A. from Shelton College, and an

M.Div., Th.M. and Th.D. from Grace Theological Seminary. He has also completed Post-Doctoral research at Union Theological Seminary. Dr. Manahan was an Instructor of Old Testament and Philosophy at Grand Rapids School of the Bible and Music from 1971-1977. He has also been a Special Lecturer at AuSable Institute of Environmental Studies.

Dr. Manahan has been a member of the Board of the American Red Cross Kosciusko County Chapter since 1991 and is currently serving as the Chairman.

Dr. Manahan served as pastor of Orland Congregational Church in Orland, IN and has filled several interim pastor positions including

two Grace Brethren churches. He is a member of the Fellowship of Grace Brethren Churches.

Speaking to the Grace employees Dr. Manahan said: "These past few months have been difficult and I have learned many things. First, the job is big and God's leadership alone is sufficient. Second, students are still the focus of what we all do. Grace has some very good things about it, but we can be better. We must move proactively toward our future—we can acknowledge challenges, but we must not blame them. I am committed to you all and to this place for how ever long God allows."

"I believe in the mission of Grace College and Seminary: Applying biblical values in strengthening character, sharpening competence, and preparing for service,"

says Dr. Manahan. "Accepting this leadership role is both humbling and invigorating. As we stay focused on students, our aim is growth, quality, and service."

"The challenges facing Christian higher education are significant: providing students access to education; educating for a diverse, interconnected world; funding private higher education; contributing to the vitality of churches; staying accountable to our public. Meeting these challenges requires the common commitment of campus and constituencies alike."

Dr. Manahan and his wife Barbara have two children: Kelly (B.A. Grace College 1990) who will graduate from Indiana University School of Medicine this spring and Nate, a junior at Warsaw High School.

Rev. Thornton's Presidential Announcement

On Thursday, April 1, 1993, I had the sobering task of making two announcements: the resignation of Dr. John Davis as president and the establishment of a Presidential Search Committee.

For the past ten months this Committee has been working. The selection was made after an intensive search which included:

1. Surveys and interviews both on and off Grace campus to solicit input to assist in better understanding the unique needs of Grace Schools; to develop a presidential profile; to compile a list of potential prospects. Among those surveyed or interviewed were:

- Grace administrators, employees, faculty, and students

- A random selection of Grace alumni

- FGBC National Ministries Leaders and Board Chairman

- The entire FGBC National Ministerium

- A selected group of visionary pastors

- Personal contacts with various individuals

2. Careful assessment of the list of suggested names, followed by a review of resumes and references which led to interviews conducted with those considered to be the most promising.

3. Evaluation of the prospects against the profile in light of the leadership needs of Grace, the comparative strengths of the candidates, and the Committee's sense of the appropriateness of the man for this time.

Among all those who were considered, the Committee kept coming back to the same man as the one who best satisfied the Presidential Profile as it related to the unique leadership needs of Grace.

Vision and vision casting, trustworthiness, conflict resolution skills, involvement of others in problem solving, willingness and desire to be held accountable for planning and results are among the leadership qualities in which we feel he rates exceptionally high.

I am delighted to announce to you that on Friday, January 21, the Board of Trustees appointed Dr. Ronald E. Manahan as the fifth President of Grace College and Seminary.

Local news coverage

The Warsaw, IN Times Union daily newspaper featured Dr. Manahan's appointment in a front page story. The article read:

Manahan said he is "delighted" for the opportunity to serve as president, "I want us to be aggressive as an institution to offer education services," he said.

In keeping with this goal, Manahan hopes to implement changes that will help the college and the seminary grow. "We must take the responsibility and accountability to become proactive about programming," he said.

His ideas include an aggressive recruitment program and a long-range plan for new programs in the college and seminary. A pro-

posal for off-campus educational services is also being developed.

Manahan also hopes to make it easier financially for students to attend Grace. "I want to find creative alternatives to help students finance their education. It's an enormous challenge," he said.

He went on to say that there has been "considerable improvement" in Grace's financial picture and he is not anticipating more staff cuts.

Manahan's other goals include a stronger relationship with the community. "I am very interested in making a strong commitment to our community," he said. "We want to contribute to this community that's been very good to us."

Grace purchases Westminster Hotel

The Administration of Grace College and Seminary announce the purchase of the Westminster Hotel from the Free Methodist Church of North America. The final closing for the property sale occurred on January 15.

"Our purchase of the Westminster Hotel represents the intention of Grace to grow and better serve the housing needs of our students. The building is of particular significance to Grace because former generations of students were housed there," explains Dr. Manahan.

"This project is especially gratifying since we will also be able to provide space within the building for community use. The community around Grace has been very good to us and we want to be good to them in return. Being able to accomplish all that with a structure that is so important to the history of Winona Lake is an added benefit."

The Westminster Hotel, completed in 1907, was the last and the finest of Winona's four hotels. It recently received an Outstanding rating in the *Kosciusko County Interim Report of Indiana Historic Sites and Structures Inventory* based on the evaluation of a professional architectural historian at Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana.

Also known as the International Friendship

House, it is listed in the National Register of Historic Places as part of a historic district.

The Westminster Hotel, located on 9th Street in Winona Lake, will be renovated for use as student housing and to accommodate corporate and community events. An Open House to allow interested members of the community to view the building before renovations begin was held on February 6.

Andersen Foundation gives \$225,000

Grace College and Seminary have received a \$225,000 gift from the Andersen Foundation of Bayport, Minnesota.

The foundation, a long-time supporter of Grace College, provides support for private accredited institutions of higher education which build and operate without accepting institutional federal, state, or local government funds or loans, including tax funds for faculty or student research projects.

Jim Kessler: Hall of Fame inductee

Grace College Men's Basketball Head Coach Jim Kessler has been nominated to the National Christian College Athletic Association (NCCAA) Hall of Fame. He will be inducted into the Hall of Fame in March at a ceremony in Marion, IN.

Coach Kessler began coaching at Grace College, his alma mater, in 1975 and has held the position of Head Coach for the past 16 years.

His accomplishments include:

- A career record of 337-192, nine Mid-Central Conference Coach of the Year honors
- Nine Mid-Central Conference championships
- Two NAIA District 21 championships
- Four NAIA District 21 Coach of the Year honors
- The 1992 NAIA Division II National Coach of the Year after leading the men to a national title.

Kessler has long been involved with and active in the NCCAA. He most recently served as the national coordinator for basketball during the 1992-93 season. He was selected for the Hall of Fame based on his outstanding leadership and service.

Coach Kessler and his wife Susanne live in Winona Lake and are the parents of four daughters, Kimberly, Sarah, Jennifer, and Janelle.

Upcoming DMin Courses

The Seminary's Doctor of Ministry program will offer the following courses in the coming months:

Dynamics of Church Growth, March 14-18. Definitions of church growth, philosophies, and methodologies will be studied and evaluated.

The course is taught by Dr. Gary McIntosh, Director of the DMin program at Talbot Seminary.

The Practice of Ministry Leadership, May 30 - June 3. A study of the biblical concepts of ministry leadership. Discussion includes the role of vision, strategy, planning, goal setting, motivating people, and development of a philosophy of ministry. Other topics are leadership development, working with a board, conflict resolution, and church discipline.

The course is led by author Lyle Schaller of the Yokefellows Institute. This course includes a 1-day Christian Leadership Seminar.

Reaching America's Culture for Christ, June 6 - 10. Develop a strategy for outreach in the local church. This includes an assessment of the pastor's leadership style, resources available for evangelism, unique opportunities provided by culture, and keeping outreach at the forefront of the church's mission.

Taught by Dr. John Vawter, former president of Western Seminary and Rev. Richard Davis, Senior Pastor of Hope Presbyterian Church, Minneapolis, MN.

Foundations for Ministry, June 13-17. A required course for all DMin students, this class includes opportunities to assess strengths and weaknesses, including the use of testing tools and creation of a personal and professional development plan.

Instructors are Prof. Roger Peugh of Grace Seminary, and Rev. John Teevan, Senior Pastor of the Winona Lake Grace Brethren Church.

Roy Lowrie

Roy Lowrie dies unexpectedly

Professor Emeritus Roy Lowrie, died unexpectedly of an apparent heart attack January 29 at his home in South Carolina. He was 66.

Dr. Lowrie was a graduate of Philadelphia College of the Bible and Wheaton College. He held Master and Doctor degrees in Education from Temple University.

For 28 years he was the Headmaster of the well-known Delaware County Christian School in Newtown Square, Pennsylvania just outside Philadelphia. He was also a Christian camp director including 21 years at Camp Sankanac.

As Executive Director of the National Association of Christian Schools Dr. Lowrie was one of the leaders in the merger that created the Association of Christian Schools International (ACSI). After that merger he was named the President of ACSI.

Dr. Lowrie was the Director of the National Institute of Christian School Administration from 1971 to 1993 and Director of Grace Seminary's M.A. Program in Christian School Administration from 1986 until 1993. In 1994 that program was relocated to Columbia Bible College, Columbia South Carolina.

On behalf of Christian school ministries, Dr. Lowrie traveled extensively

in the United States as well as the Dominican Republic, Bahamas, Japan, Korea, Okinawa, Hong Kong, and the Philippines.

He was an author, conference speaker, and the producer and host of a radio program heard on several Christian stations.

A memorial service honoring Dr. Lowrie was held at Delaware County Christian School Saturday, February 5.

Dr. Lowrie is survived by his wife Margaret "Peg", four daughters, and one son.

Business students win state competition

Josh Canada, Jonathan Moeller, and Mike Yoder, business students at Grace College are the recipients of the 1993 "Outstanding Small Business Institute Case Award." Don Owen, Business Development Specialist with the U.S. Small Business Administration, attended the lunch held in the students' honor and pre-

sented them with their award certificates.

The three students developed their case study with Azure Software, Inc. located in Leesburg, Indiana. Dave Tyler, President of Azure Software, Inc., and Tyler Machinery Co., has designed a financial software program called PACEE (Project Analysis for Capital Equipment Expenditures.) PACEE generates detailed and summary reports for any capital equipment project.

The goal of the study was to provide information for international marketing of PACEE. Under the direction of Business Prof. Anthony Avallone, director of the Small Business Institute at Grace College, the students explored selected English and Spanish speaking

countries and various exporting options. A market study report was completed and formally presented to Tyler, with recommendations for action.

Tyler commended the students: "These three men are unusually gifted students who worked diligently. They took the time to learn about my product, study the market, and generate a careful report. Working with them and Prof. Avallone has been a very positive experience."

Grace College is one of fifteen colleges and universities in Indiana involved in the Small Business Institute program sponsored by the SBA. Over 100 teams provided management assistance to small business owners in Indiana during 1993.

Men in midst of challenging season

The Men's Basketball team knew that duplicating the successes of the past two seasons would be difficult. Even with seniors Brian Elliott and Trent Lehman returning, they faced an unfriendly schedule with 15 of the first 17 games away.

The Lancers began the season with a consolation victory at the Urbana (OH) tip-off tournament, which started a five game winning streak. During that tournament, Lehman passed the 200 milestone for three point shots.

A victory over NCAA Division III foe Calvin in the Grace Optimist Tournament was the centerpiece of the winning streak. Included

was the first of two 40-plus point games by Brian Elliott, who posted 45 that night and 44 later in the season.

Then hard times set in. Coach Kessler's club dropped eight of the next nine, with only a huge upset of NAIA Division I rival Urbana as a bright spot. The last loss came on New Year's Eve at Biola (CA), the first of a four game west coast road trip.

The Lancers traveled to San Diego for the Crusader Classic at Point Loma College where they won three straight games and brought home the championship. Elliott, who leads the club with 26.2 ppg average, brought home MVP honors.

Grace opened their Mid Central Conference schedule against Huntington in Lancer Gym and promptly sent the Foresters home with a 94-85 defeat. But, the four game surge was followed by a loss at Bethel and losses to Marian and Indiana Wesleyan at home.

"We have always hoped, win or lose, that our program would teach our men through basketball, that there is more in life than basketball," says Coach Kessler. "We want them to learn to work together and most of all to play hard within our guidelines. That's the challenge of coaching."

The Lancers boast the best team free throw percentage among the NAIA Division II with 78.9%. The Men's record stands at 10-12, with a 1-3 mark in the MCC.

Women bounce back

The 1993-94 season has been a tough one for the Lady Lancer basketball team. They entered the season hopeful, losing just one player from last year's team. But, these hopes were quickly dashed as they started the season with nine losses.

A 76-59 win against Greenville (IL) College provided the first ray of hope for the season. Losses to Walsh and Malone followed, and the ladies went home for Christmas at 1-11.

The new year brought four more losses in the first week. However, week two brought exciting victories against Goshen, 63-56, and Manchester, 91-82.

February began with a 10 point win against Bethel. Following a loss to Taylor, the ladies rebounded with a 66-65 thriller over Marian, moving their record to 5-19.

Junior captain Amy Mitchell has provided consistent offense and leadership. Averaging 18.1 points a game, Mitchell led Grace in scoring 13 times.

Sophomore Meredith Aitken thrills fans with her all-out style of play. Aitken, who earned All-District and All-Conference recognition last season, averaged 12.4 points, 6.2 rebounds, and 4.2 steals per outing in '93-94.

Junior Allison Chrimer tops the team in rebounds with 8.7 and shooting percentage with 50%.

Softball set for another banner year

Even though the Lady Lancers softball team lost 6 of the 14 members of last year's conference and district championship team, Coach Phil Dick is extremely optimistic.

One big reason for this confidence is the return of All-American candidate Heather Everhart. The three-time NAIA All-District pitcher set school records with 21 victories, a 0.56 ERA, and 169 strikeouts in 1993. She placed second in the nation in ERA and sixth in strike outs per inning.

Everhart and senior All-District third baseman Tabitha Cooper will provide the nucleus for a championship season.

Another of the team's strengths is defense. Strong-armed NAIA All-District Evelene Clemons returns behind the plate. Last season's leading hitter and record-setting speedster Meredith Aitken anchors a strong outfield.

Says Coach Dick, "The main key to success this season will be our ability to blend as a team. As many as six positions could see different faces from last season. Our ability to adapt will be a major factor in our march to back-to-back NAIA District 21 Championships and a trip to the National Tournament in Columbia, Missouri."

The season begins at home against Tri-State on March 12.

Scrapbook from Quito



16 students, faculty members, and spouses left South Bend on November 19 for ten days in Quito.

Last November HCJB World Radio, an international shortwave missionary radio station located in Ecuador, South America invited Tim Zimmerman, The Grace Brass and members of the Grace Orchestra to Quito.

Every year HCJB presents several concerts in that capitol city honoring the city's Independence Day and the birth of Christ. Thousands of people hear as the 100 voice choir and full orchestra present the gospel in music to schools and before standing-room-only crowds in the largest theater in the country.

"I wanted our students to see how music can fit

into missions and how effective it can be," says Prof. Zimmerman. "And right from the start they faced some of the same challenges that career missionaries face. We were stranded in Miami due to an airline strike which got us off schedule."

They never actually got back on.

"Things move slower in the Ecuadorian culture," explains Zimmerman. "Nothing starts exactly on time, schedules change, no one gets too excited. Our itinerary went through eight changes—we just kept re-printing it. Flexibility was the word."

Tragedy struck the missionary community the first

day they arrived. Two daughters of an HCJB family were killed. "That put a black cloud over everything. It was so painful to watch them grieve. But that, again, was the reality of what missions can entail."

"From that low we went to the incredible high of performing in a highly professional setting filled with highly professional demands and recognition."

They were unexpectedly asked to participate in producing an album. 14 hours of a recording session in the high tech, state of the art studio at HCJB Radio was a new experience for most all of the musicians. Next came the music video to be used by Asoma, the new christian television station in Quito.

Then, they were invited to play for the President of Ecuador. They performed in his palace, were given a tour and even invited into his cabinet room.

Then came the concerts.

"We performed in seven super concerts. Imagine—2000 screaming Latins packed into the theater for each concert. We were amazed at the broad spectrum of people who came. We also did concerts in schools and the military universities."

Prof adds: "My other goal for this trip was to get the students into a professional situation so that they could see how they stack up. They were playing next to the best—the National Symphony Orchestra, in front of huge audiences. I was really pleased with how they handled themselves and how they performed."

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Seminary offers new M.Div in Counseling

People everywhere have problems. One of the most constant consuming challenges that a church faces is helping members successfully work through the realities of personally difficult situations.

But many pastors have learned the hard way that this much needed counseling ministry often is a draining experience that can intensify into a giant magnet drawing them away from other equally important responsibilities. Their training to preach and administer might not have prepared them to adequately respond to this demanding aspect of ministry.

One answer is to consistently refer church people in need of counsel to outside professionals. However, this practice often raises concerns. What type of advice will be given? Will it be consistent with God's Word? Why isn't the church able to help when it claims to have the truth for life's biggest questions?

Another answer, particularly for a church that has grown to the point where an associate pastor is a possibility, is to put someone on staff who has received specialized training in basic counseling.

Unfortunately, thoroughly trained biblical counselors are a rare commodity. In the past, those who wanted Master's level train-

ing in counseling that was founded on a solid theological basis were limited to a traditional M.Div. degree plus further training in counseling.

That road is long and requires course work that is ultimately geared toward the senior pastor role. Some individuals who want to minister within the local church do not have the gifts or the desire to be the "preaching pastor."

On the other hand, many programs that offer MA degrees in counseling focus mostly on psychological matters. Though graduates may understand theories and methodologies, they may not have received substantial, broad based training in theology or serious Bible study. Their understanding of psychological matters, therefore, might stand upon a relatively small foundation of biblical understanding.

Grace Theological Seminary desires to provide a better answer to this dilemma.

In the fall of 1994 the Master of Divinity in Counseling degree program will be launched. This M.Div program will provide instruction in theology, the original languages of the Bible, and the background studies that are essential to prepare a person for serious Bible study.

As a counseling program it will also supply the comprehensive instruction and interaction that is needed to prepare a person to effectively counsel others within the context of the local church.

Both facets will be pursued in a distinctly Christian way, with an unwavering commitment to the authority and sufficiency of the Bible.

"We are seeking to offer a program that is both biblical and relevant. Too often Christian counseling is biblical but does not effectively address the real, painful issues in people's lives," says Dr. Tom Edgington, Professor in Counseling.

Dr. Edgington holds a B.A. from Grace College, M.A., and M.Div. from Grace Seminary, and a Ph.D. from Ball State University. He is a Licensed Psychologist by the State of Indiana and a Health Service Provider in Psychology sanctioned by Indiana as an independent counseling practitioner.

"The type of true biblical counseling we mean to teach is helping individuals find God and walk on his path. God is not an escape we use just to be more comfortable," he adds. "Problems won't miraculously go away, but we will have truth as a foundation for the help we give."
